## *INCENSE*

### Informative Overview

Incense is a material that releases fragrant smoke when burned, traditionally used across cultures for ceremonial, spiritual, and practical purposes. Its use can be traced back thousands of years, with evidence found in ancient Egypt, India, China, and the Middle East, where it played a role in ritual practice, daily life, and environmental scenting.

Today, incense continues to be used in both spiritual and secular settings to create atmosphere, support focus, and mark intentional moments.

#### **What Is Incense?**

Incense is typically made from a blend of natural materials such as:

Plant resins (e.g., frankincense, myrrh)

Woods (e.g., sandalwood)

Herbs, flowers, and spices

Essential oils and binding agents

These ingredients are combined into forms that can be safely burned to release scent into the air.

#### **Common Forms of Incense**

Incense Sticks - The most widely used form; easy to light and suitable for everyday use

Incense Cones - Compact and fast-burning; producing a stronger, more concentrated scent

Loose Incense (Resin or Herbal Blends) - Burned on charcoal discs; often used in more traditional or ritual settings

Each form offers a different intensity, burn time, and level of involvement.

#### **Purpose and Use**

Mark the beginning or end of a practice

Enhance sensory awareness

#### **Scent Associations**

Different incense materials are traditionally linked with particular qualities:

Sandalwood - grounding, warm, and steady

Frankincense - reflective, resinous, and historically ceremonial

Lavender - calming and soft

Patchouli - earthy and rich

Citrus Blends - fresh and uplifting

These associations are based on both historical use and the psychological impact of scent.

#### **Practical Considerations**

Incense should always be used with care:

Burn in a well-ventilated space

Use appropriate holders or heat-resistant surfaces

Never leave burning incense unattended

Be mindful of smoke sensitivity for yourself and others
